Weeks 1-3 same female model Weeks 4-6 same male model Weeks 7-9 same female model

Week 1: Introduction: Short slide show of historical and contemporary figurative based sculpture.

- Gesture clay "sketches"
- Emphasis on gesture/form/weight/anatomy/properties of clay
- Demo/Lecture working with armatures vs. no armatures

Week 2: Short slide show of historical and contemporary figurative with emphasis on anatomy

- Beginning with gesture sketches moving into longer poses
- Emphasis on gesture/anatomy proportions
- Armature building
- One hour pose

Week 3: Slide show

- Continue work on last weeks one-hour pose
- Emphasis on anatomy and expression
- Group critique of first completed piece in greenware phase
- Finishing the greenware phase of the piece

Week 4: Slide Show male figure

- Beginning with gesture sketches moving into longer poses
- Emphasis on gesture/anatomy proportions
- One hour pose
- Demo of different building techniques in clay (encouraged to use different techniques).

Week 5: Continuing on male figure long pose

- Surface treatment of first piece
- Discussion of expression versus form

Week6: Finishing male figure in greenware state

- Critique
- Begin experimenting with different cold finishing techniques on first fired piece

Week 7: Female model

- Anatomy relationship to exaggeration/abstraction
- Emphasis on expression/exaggeration/form/abstracting from the figure
- Short poses
- One hour pose

Week 8: Continuing work on third piece

- Expression/anatomy/abstraction
- Long pose
- Surface treatment of second piece

Week 9: Finishing third piece

• Critiques

Week 10: Final critiques

• Surface treatment of third piece
